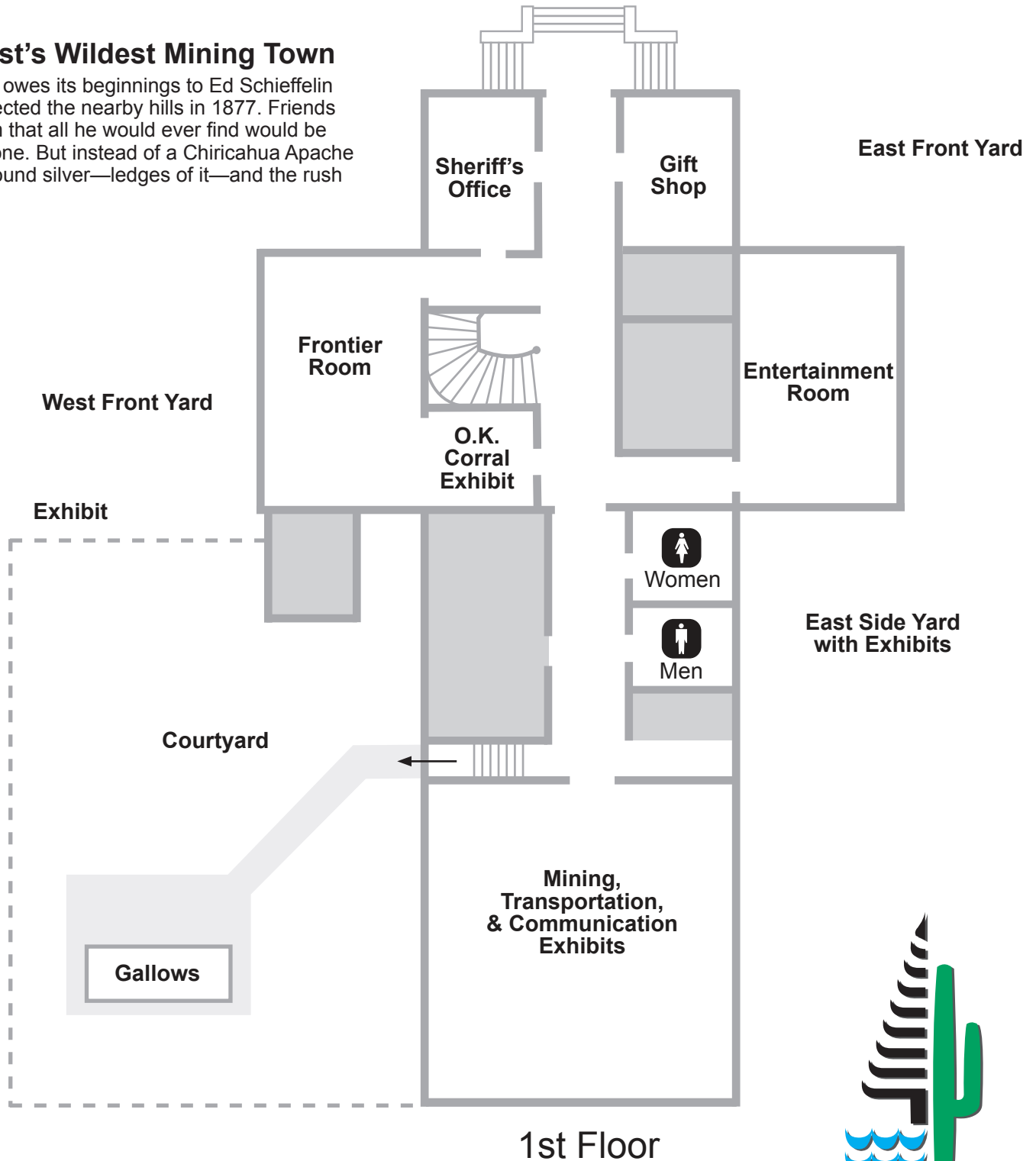

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Step Into the Past

at **Tombstone Courthouse State Historic Park**. Built in the shape of a Roman cross, the two-story 1882 Victorian structure once housed the Cochise County offices of the Sheriff, Recorder, Treasurer, Jail, Courtrooms, and the Board of Supervisors. Today, the old county courthouse is a 12,000 square foot museum filled with the glitter and guns of those who tamed the territory.

Huge rooms inside the old courthouse feature exhibits chronicling Tombstone's colorful frontier history from Geronimo and the silver mining days, to the O.K. Corral gun battle, and the stories of Tombstone's unique but no less notorious citizens.

The self-guided tour allows visitors to become immersed in the most factual presentation of Tombstone's sometimes rowdy and lawless past.

Guided tours of the facility are available upon request for an additional fee and are dependent on staff availability.

Park Rules

1. No food or beverages, except water, are allowed inside the Courthouse.
2. No running.
3. Do not cross exhibit partitions.
4. No pets allowed!
5. No skateboarding or bicycles allowed on steps, walkways and parking lots.
6. No firearms, BB, pellet guns, bows, or fireworks.
7. Please turn off (or set to vibrate) cells phones and personal communication devices.
8. No smoking.
9. Non-commercial photography allowed in the building.
